Succeeding in High School

After being in the business of education for twenty-six years, it is evident that there is no magic to helping teenagers be successful in high school. However, there are several key fundamental strategies that will significantly improve every teenager's ability to learn and get the most out of high school.

- First and foremost, students must be in attendance; students learn by doing and participating in the learning activities facilitated by teachers. *Nebraska State Statute* 79-201 (Compulsory Attendance Law)
- Teenagers need their sleep. According to the National Sleep Foundation, sleep is like food for the brain and teenagers need between 8 ½ to 9 ½ hours of sleep daily. Teenagers who get the required amount of sleep will do better in school, are more likely improve their listening and focusing skills, are able to solve problems better, and their behavior is more likely to be positive.
- Students must do their homework, assignments, projects etc. on time. When students earn zero credit for an assignment, their grades suffer significantly.
- Students need to be organized. When students use their daily planner, keep their lockers, notebooks, and assignments organized, they are more likely to earn higher grades.
- Every student needs to be involved in at least one extra-curricular activity. When students are involved in extracurricular activities, they perform better in the classroom. Many experts have provided evidence that demonstrates students do better academically and socially when they are involved in extra-curricular activities. However, their is also evidence that some students' academic achievement declines if they are involved in too many extra-curricular activities.

At the beginning of the school year, the school has a number of procedures we must do in order for us to operate efficiently. State and federal public school laws require the school to have several pertinent documents filled out by parents and students. The required forms that students and parents need to fill out completely are located in the back of the student's handbook. 

products manufacturers have developed. Unlike some of the products introduced three years ago, these taste good as the food companies have had time to perfect their products. If you have not eaten breakfast or lunch with us before or it has been a while, please give us a try. We would love to have you eat with us. Parents and grandparents are always welcome. Just let the office know before 9:00 a.m. of the day you will be joining us.

Due to the Avian Flu, there may be changes to the published menu as we go through the school year. Many of our food items are made from poultry because they are usually lower in fat than beef and pork. It is too early to know how long the existing supplies of poultry products will last before new birds become mature. I am already receiving notification concerning the availability of some items.

Lastly, I would like to urge everyone to fill out the Free or Reduced Lunch application form even if you do not think you will qualify. Our schools are eligible for many grants and other programs if at least 50% or more of the enrolled students receive free or reduced meals. Last year, the elementary school had 49.5%. We missed qualifying for an equipment grant by .5%! The middle and high schools were not nearly as close.

I hope to see you eating breakfast or lunch with us this year. Sincerely, Lynette Weller, RD Food Service Manager

Central City Public Schools will still utilize a point of sale system (POS) through the lunch line. Shown on the reverse of this letter is an updated CCPS Family Lunch Account Usage Form. You will note the software requires you, as the parent/guardian, to designate how you wish to appropriate your lunch deposit if you have multiple students on your account. For example, if you send payment for \$100 for your account, and have designated 60% for the High School Student and 40% for the Elementary Student, \$60 will be in the High Student's account, and \$40 in the Elementary Student's account. If you designate no % amounts on your form, then the student accounts will be credited equally.

We are not able to transfer funds from one student account to another. When one student has a low balance, a deposit will need to be made for that individual student's account. If, at any time, you wish to change how you have chosen to split your deposits, please contact the Superintendent's office.

Now is a good time to start sending in payments to get your family lunch account ready to go. The Central City Public Schools lunch program will <u>not</u> extend credit to families for purchase of meals or a la carte food items. Remember: Your lunch account is a debit system. Money must be in the office no later than 10:00 a.m. Please allow one (1) day for processing of money into your lunch account.

When a student reaches a -\$10.00 balance in their lunch account (or -\$2.00 reduced meals), the student will no longer be allowed to charge. A peanut butter sandwich and milk will be served. Students in the middle and high school will not be allowed to charge a la carte items once they reach a negative balance in their account. Parents can view student lunch accounts on Infinite Campus.


