To: All Central City Public Schools Community and Staff

We have enjoyed a busy month in our schools. Our Administrator Team has been reviewing plans for next year's school calendar, plans for Summer School this year, preliminary work for next year's course offerings and daily schedule, planning for staff training for our Reading program as well as discussion of other topics.

Our Board of Education has been busy as well. The Board has approved to hold a Monthly Work Session on the first Monday each month. The Work Sessions will be for discussion and presentations only, with no action items on those agendas. The regular board meetings will still be scheduled, as in the past, for the 3rd Monday of each month.

The Board has approved replacement of lighting in the Elementary and High School gyms; to repair water drainage problems at the Middle School; to make repairs for coverings on steel bleacher supports at the Stadium, and to replace windows at the Concessions Room with stainless steel roll-up serving windows. Additionally, the Board has approved to move the supervision of our Special Education program to ESU 7 of Columbus, and to advertise for the District's Special Education Director, a new position. This change will be effective at the start of the 2015-2016 school year. The need for changes in our SPED program have been discussed since last Fall. Our current board has 3 new members, seated in January, and I must note that all six members are working together in a very effective manner. All members are concentrating on providing excellent leadership for our school district and students.

Our plans for the 2015-2016 school year calendar are underway, and we are trying to provide for 175 student days in our classrooms, and to start the school year a week later than this year. Our current working draft has the first day for students on Monday, August 17. We are considering to provide Christmas Vacation December 23 to January 3. The High School Graduation is scheduled for May 15, 2016. The calendar will be approved at the April board meeting.

We have used Survey Monkey as the tool to ask for and receive input from parents of students on a couple of calendar items of some concern for the next year. Another survey will be sent to parents on another concern for the calendar. We will welcome and appreciate the parents' input. We are having a very good school year now, and are planning for a successful 2015-2016 school year.

From the High School Principals Desk

I would like to bring the community up-to-date on the high school driver's education program and the Power Drive class. Both of these programs deal with transportation and both impact student's skills and knowledge of vehicles.

First and foremost, it is vitally important that all kids behind the wheel of 2000 pound vehicle that is capable of traveling 100 plus miles per hour have the necessary training and skills to operate the motorized vehicle. According to the U.S. Department of Transportation, there were *3,328 people killed because of distracted drivers during 2012 in the U.S.* To put it in perspective, in the U.S. alone, there were about the same number of people killed due to distracted drivers as there are people in Central City. Additionally, it is the responsibility of both parents and the school to work together to help give our kids the necessary driving skills and knowledge to operate automobiles skillfully.

On behalf of the school, I asked the school board to continue to support and approve the driver's education program. They demonstrated their support by approving the high school driver's ed. program by their unanimous votes at the last board meeting. As a district, we have always tried to keep our costs of the program below what other schools in the area are charging. Many of the conference schools charge between \$280.00-\$300.00 for the class. Central City High School charges students who attend Central City Public Schools \$250.00 and out-of-district students \$280.00. Students are eligible to participate in the program by being 14 years of age at the time of the driver's education class and the student must have a driver's permit. The students will receive 20 plus hours of classroom instruction and six hours of driving and observation. Upon successful completion of the program, students can waive the DMV written and driving test. Both Mrs. Anna Detlefsen and Mr. Duerkson teach the driver's ed. course and are DMV certified. For registration information, parents can contact the high school office.

Speaking of transportation, we recently added a class called Power Drive. This course, originally designed by the Nebraska Public Power District, allows students a hands-on way to apply their studies through types of automotive, electric, and energy technology. This course is an educational effort that challenges high school students to engineer and build a one-person electric vehicle during the school year. The Power Drive Program encourages interest in energy-related and automotive-related industries. A light-electric vehicle (LEV) competition, Power Drive does so by bringing a practical focus to students design and construct a safe, energy-efficient electric vehicle that they showcase during a series of rallies in the spring. They work in teams, under the direction of instructors who have been trained at Power Drive workshops. The teams of students compete with other teams at organized rallies in areas such as vehicle breaking, maneuverability, and endurance. Many schools receive sponsorships from local businesses to support the added costs of the program. Mr. Matt Shrader is the instructor that teaches and sponsors the Power Drive class/activity.



4th Grader Scientists

The 4th graders have been busy working on a scientific experiment. Half of the students are determining which of 3 sunscreen brands (Coppertone, Equate, or Banana Boat SPF 30) is most effective in preventing ultra-violet ray damage to our skin. The other half of the class are checking to see which Coppertone SPF (8, 30, or 100) works best against ultra-violet rays. After writing the problem they were trying to answer, the students came up with a hypothesis for each problem. Next, they used their materials list to prepare the experiments, then they wrote a step-by-step procedure in following through with the experiments. After going outside during the beautiful weather to gather the necessary information using ultra-violet beads in the sunlight, the students made a graph to record their findings. If the beads in sunscreen remained colorless or a dull color the sunscreen was effective. Our control with no sunscreen turned a very bright color in the sun. The data was analyzed to prepare a conclusion relating to the hypothesis. Some students from Mrs. Gillan's biology class will be coming to share their science projects with us. The 4th grade students will be able to see how the High School students are also using the Scientific Method in their experiments with Fast Plants. Now the 4th graders will be doing a scientific method experiment at home and sharing their results with the class.


