We have worked all year long, not just for the state tests that will be taken over the next several weeks, but to make sure that our students are growing and improving. Some students may progress academically nine, ten, even 12 months in the same time frame.

We are challenged to do that everyday across the buildings of our school district. As the year speeds to a close, we do not want to have parents, administrators, teachers, or students thinking that because state testing is here we will stop teaching. We still have much to do and much more instructional time ahead.

CCPS remains committed to providing our students with the rigorous, wellrounded educational opportunities and experiences they've come to expect from Central City Public Schools. We remain steadfast in our commitment to educate, challenge and prepare each and every CCPS student with lifelong skills for the world around them. Thanks for supporting the school throughout the school year. Community and parent involvement is an essential component for student success.

HEALTHY TIPS FOR TESTING

Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) Testing season is fast approaching Central City Public Schools 3rd-8th and 11th grade students. Testing can be stressful! A healthy student has a better opportunity to learn and test better.

- Eight to ten hours of sleep are essential.
- A healthy breakfast helps the brain function, be sure to add a protein source in the breakfast, such as meat, eggs, cheese, milk, and yogurt.
- Encourage your student to eat at least 3 servings of vegetables and 2 servings of fruit per day.
- Testing stress may lead to complaints of headache or stomachache. Allowing your student to talk about the stress may decrease the symptoms.
- Brag on your student every chance you can. Nothing makes them feel better, than to know their parent is proud of them.

KINDERGARTEN REGISTRATION

An informational meeting for parents and guardians of children who are eligible to attend Kindergarten during the 2014-2015 school year will be held in the Central City Elementary Lunchroom on Monday, April 7, 2014 beginning at 6:30 p.m.



A child must turn 5 years old on or before July 31 of the school year in which he/she enters Kindergarten. The informational meeting on Monday, April 7th is for parents/guardians only. Information will be shared regarding the Kindergarten schedule, school readiness, registration, immunization requirements along with Kindergarten physicals, dental and vision exam requirements.

Please bring along current immunization records and birth certificate (certified copy) and also come prepared with your child's emergency contact information to complete the registration form. <u>Immunization record and birth certificate are required for children to start the first day of school in August.</u>

If you cannot come to registration on April 7th, please stop by the Elementary Office on Friday, April 11th from 9:00-2:30 p.m. and register your child.



PAC News Release

The PAC (Performing Arts Center) advisory committee approved several improvements for the PAC including microphones, lighting, and electronic equipment at their meeting on Tuesday, March 4th. The advisory committee was established to monitor funds from private donations for the Performing Arts Center. Members include Candy Conradt and Dale Palser, representing CCPS, Chuck Griffith and Shannon Hannappel, representing Merrick Foundation, Tina Schnitzler and Suzanne Philippi representing the arts council and Cathy Blauhorn, representing out-of-district citizens.

Superintendent, Candy Conradt reported that the PAC 's schedule is very busy and many schools and outside groups are using the facility for a variety of uses. The Merrick Arts Council is also completing their first season this spring. She also relayed that restroom doors have recently been installed.

The PAC advisory committee meets 3 times per year to monitor facility use and approve purchases for maintenance and facility upgrades. Two funds support the facility, namely the Edwin and Bernice Lock fund and the PAC fund. These funds were established to pay for utilities, maintenance, equipment and building improvements. The combined principal of these two funds is currently over 2 million dollars.

MS Parents,

Every school deals with students struggling to stay focused and disciplined as the school year winds down. I don't blame them for starting to get anxious about summer break. We just wish we didn't have to start dealing with it the first day of the 4th quarter! As a faculty, we are restating our expectations and assuring students that, although it is the 4th quarter and it's starting to look and feel like spring and the end of the school year, there is a lot of teaching and learning that still has to happen. We are reasonable and understand that human nature of middle school kids this time of year makes it nearly impossible to maintain focus all day every day so we try to find a new balance of expectations and tolerance. Your encouragement and support is particularly vital this last quarter of school.

With this weather, we are also seeing some summer clothing in school. Shorts, tanktops, and flip-flops are becoming more prevalent. The student handbook provides some guidelines about appropriate dress but it basically does come down to my discretion. I do not particularly like being the "clothing police" but that is one of the reasons I get paid the "big bucks." I do expect a level of "good taste & modesty" as spelled out in the handbook. The handbook gives me quite a bit of discretion to determine what is appropriate and what is not. A couple expectations that I want to emphasize are: shirts which expose the shoulders and/or undergarments, including tank tops, are not acceptable. T-shirts with the side cut out of them are not acceptable. Shorts that are not longer than a students extended arms/fingertips are not acceptable. I have had to share with the ladies that running shorts, which are appropriate for P.E., are not appropriate for the regular school day. These are the few common inappropriate choices that we might see in the middle school as the weather continues to get warmer. I expect and appreciate your support in helping us maintain a proper environment for learning.

If your child has come home and indicated to you that we wouldn't let them use the phone at school, they are probably telling you the truth. We get lots of requests to call home because they forgot something that they feel they need to survive the school days. Homework, permission slips, P.E. shoes, \$2 for the field trip are not what I consider "emergencies" and so we do not let them call home in the middle of the day, and expect you to come a runnin, with whatever they forgot. So in a way, I am doing you a favor. We are trying to teach them to be a little more responsible and if they aren't they may be a bit inconvenienced for not coming to school prepared. I am aware that many/most of our students have cell phones and so they might text/call you when they need you to bring them something. Our cell phone "policy" is, if we see it or hear it, they lose it. Of course, if there is an emergency, we will call or give them permission but for the most part, they are beginning to understand that our office phone is not for student use.

I want to conclude by encouraging you to contact us if/when your child comes home with some information that just doesn't make sense or is unsettling. Many times, you may need "the rest of the story." Please don't conclude that you are getting the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth from your child. Again, if it doesn't sound right, it probably isn't and you need to contact us to make sure we don't have a misunder-standing which jeopardizes our relationship. Home and school need to have a close, trusting relationship so that your child has the best opportunity to be successful.
