We have just completed the Central City search for our new Superintendent. The Board offered the contract to Mr. Jeff Jensen, Supt. at Creighton Community Schools, one of the three interview finalists. Mr. Jensen has accepted the offer and we are working out the contract terms now. I am very positive that our Board of Education has offered the right person for this position. Mr. Jensen is scheduled to start July 1st.

I know, as a McPherson & Jacobson consultant, that we had a great search. It is a good feeling to know the Board had three good candidates to interview. The various Stakeholder groups' input seemed to be aligned with the Board's choice as well. Each group met with the candidates for one hour each of the three days. It is important to note the relevance of the Stakeholder's input to the Board; a very important piece. The groups were: High School Student Council, Classified Support Staff, Community Members, Certified Teachers, and Administrators. A big Thank You to these groups from our Board and myself.

The McPherson & Jacobson consulting firm provides a very transparent and involved stakeholders process; however, our search was more than that. Our Board met in open session to discuss the interviews, read stakeholder's input, and make their decision. This was the first search I have been involved with where the Board did not move to a closed session to discuss the interviews. My thought at the conclusion of that November 17 meeting was, the public attending tonight had to feel that our Board of Education can and should be trusted. This is a very important quality.

Besides working the next few months to assure Mr. Jensen a smooth transition to our School District, my final pleasure will be in Phase V of the search process. The other consultant, Dr. Mike Cunning, and I will meet with the Board and Superintendent sometime in early August. The purpose of this session will be to define the top 3 or 4 priorities the new Superintendent will focus on during his first year. The Board will be asked to determine what they will accept as evidence that progress is being made. Phase V is important because it will define in clear terms the beginning of a successful Board/Superintendent relationship. This is very important in keeping the main focus on our students and their learning experiences.

My one purpose with this column is for our community and staff to see that I am very proud to be part of Central City and our school district. The Board and I thank all of you for your support and appreciation of our Central City Public Schools



With the start of the New Year it is a good time to reinforce good study habits and routines with your elementary child. Here are some tips to help your child develop study habits that will help them throughout their lives:

Make it routine. Have a plan for after school that your child knows when it is time to do homework and when to get started.

Be organized and develop a plan. Go through his or her backpack to see what all needs to be done and plan how it's going to get finished.

Break time - It's important to establish a break time especially if the task is difficult or longer.

Limit distractions – Students should have a quiet and clean space to do homework out of the way from distractions such as the phone, TV, etc.

Make help available – Encourage your child to work alone as appropriate, but also let your child know what to do if they need help. Ask them to try a problem first and then have you assist with the next one.

Set Goals & Track Progress – Set goals and reward your child for good study habits by giving them some additional mom or dad time or even going out for ice cream if they bring home a paper in which they've greatly improved. This teaches work ethic and patience in working hard to reach a goal.

Bottom line – Parent involvement is so important in the homework process. Believe it or not, the habits you are cultivating right now in elementary school set the tone for success in the middle, high school and even later in life. SCHOOL CLOSING INFORMATION

As winter is fast approaching, the potential for inclement weather is a distinct possibility. It may be necessary for the Central City Public Schools to close school, not open at all, or delay school due to poor visibility, slippery or snowy road conditions, or a combination of the above.



In the past, school has been delayed for an hour a number of times rather than place students on the roads in adverse weather conditions as well as in the dark. This allows the buses and student drivers daylight to drive to town, provides the time necessary to clean the roads and parking lots, and time to see how the storm will develop. The response to this has been positive and we will continue in that fashion under those kinds of weather conditions.

Please do not attempt to phone school or school officials during these times, as those persons are extremely busy gathering information on what is the best course of action. As always, safety is of utmost importance. No matter what the school does, if weather or road conditions seem unsafe where you live, do not have your students leave for school.

Head Lice

Children are prone to sharing head lice, frequently rearing its presence in the elementary grades. Although these insects cannot hop, jump or fly, they are easily transmitted from one child to another by head to head contact, sharing of hats, combs or brushes.

Students found to have head lice or nits will be sent home and not permitted to return to school until the district finds no live lice, eggs or nits.

If you find lice, do not panic. There are safe, non-toxic, effective measures you can use to treat head lice. If you should have any questions, please contact the school nurse.
