It is hard to believe that three quarters of school is in the books and only one quarter of school remains. With the number of activities, field trips, and events scheduled for the final quarter, this school year will be quickly coming to an end.

As the school year draws to a close, there are a lot of projects that are starting, and considerable planning is taking place for next year. The Industrial Technology class has begun to build walls for the new concession stand/bathroom facility, and footings, foundation, and rough-ins are in the process of completion. Hopefully, in early April, walls will be brought outside and set as the project accelerates toward a finish. The two Industrial Tech classes, led by Matt Shrader, are working the best they can under current time constraints. In the future, building construction classes will be blocked together to allow for enhanced hands-on learning activities in the building construction field and to provide more time to work on projects. This is our district's first move toward a career pathway approach to student learning opportunities. This approach will expand as issues with scheduling, graduation requirements, and facilities can be solved. Many community members have expressed their excitement for seeing students take an active part in their learning by experiencing hands-on types of opportunities.

Career pathways offer students a number of classes towards potential job fields that are typically needed in the immediate area. That piece offers the community options towards economic development and helps fill employer needs in good paying fields, while keeping local talent. Career pathways will be expanded in the future to include other opportunities in the fields of Industrial Tech, Agriculture, Health, Science, and Business. The concept will continue to come together over the next few months, into years, to provide students with educational opportunities that support the community.

If you have recently driven or walked by the middle school and high school, you will have also noticed that buildings are being demolished and the lot west of the school will eventually become an open piece of land. Again, this signifies the progress the district is making towards the future. What will inhabit this area in the future is currently unknown, but the possibilities are exciting!

As this school year enters the final quarter, I would like to take the time to applaud the community for all of the great things that are going on. The progressive approach by the community is very evident. It is great to see a community that is focusing on growing by developing and enhancing community amenities, adding housing and addressing housing issues, and looking to expand local business and business opportunities. When you listen to area leaders, you can't help but be excited for the future of Central City.

Driver Education will again be offered this summer at Central City High School at a cost of \$255 for students from our district, or going to our high

school next year, and \$290 for students out of our district. The cost will cover the 28 hours of classroom instruction, as well as the 6 hours of driving and 6 hours of observation. Students must be 14 years of age or older by October 15, 2016 to enroll and hold a valid permit to complete the driving portion of the course. The Driver Education classes will be held May 23-26 and May 31-June 2. If you are planning on enrolling your child in Driver Education classes, please contact the High School office at 308-946-3055. We are limited to 60 students for total enrollment, 30 students in each class. Driving times will be set at a later date.

Communication In Activities

There are many opportunities for parent involvement in high school activities. Parental involvement is a vital piece of any successful program. Parents can offer their services, financial support, or volunteer their time to make the experience for their child a positive one.

At times parents can monitor and scrutinize these programs to make sure their child is being treated fair and not hurt in any way. Parents have every right to do this and be part of their child's growth. Yet parents, coaches, and administrators have at times gotten mixed up in these problems, personal and professional boundaries crossed, and trust broken. This leaves all parties confused and hurt with the student caught in the middle.

So what is the appropriate role of parents in programs and how can that role be established, communicated, and performed in a healthy way? There are boundaries that need to be set. The coach doesn't get to tell parents how to raise their child, so parents should not be allowed to tell the coach how to run a program. One of the keys to making the relationship work for all parties is to understand the difference between rights and shared responsibilities. Focusing on rights tend to end up in conflict where shared responsibilities are about building relationships. Our students and student-athletes have the privilege of participating in all the different activities we provide. The shared responsibility of the parents and sponsors is to help pursue vision and strive for excellence while valuing students first.

Effective communication is one of the challenges with parental involvement. It has become a lost art in many ways. We use social media (Twitter, Instagram, Facebook, Vine, Snapchat) today more than ever. However, effective communication has not changed. Everyone appreciates a face-to-face conversation, a fist pound (the new handshake), or just a smile. You can't get that through a tweet! Yet coaches and administrators get e-mails and texts from parents all the time about problems and issues that make the sponsor out to be a problem. Healthy relationships need much more effort than typing something on-line. On the other side, our staff is constantly trying to find more efficient ways to communicate as well.

Sometimes parents just need to vent and express themselves. It can solve a lot of issues by simply listening to each other. If we can listen, we can restore trust and focus on that shared responsibilities for both parents and sponsors involving kids. Research Students Receive Grant Money

Two Central City High School Students received grant money for their scientific research projects. To receive the grants, the students had to write a grant proposal, which included a budget. Sydney W. is in Advanced Biology class and is conducting research on MRSA (methicilli resistant

Staphylococcus aureus). This is a type of staff infection that is resistant to most antibiotics. Marshall M. is in Independent Study Scientific Research Class and is researching how combining essential oils with different types of antibiotics might help fight bacterial infections. Conducting scientific research is beneficial to students in many ways, but also can be very costly. The \$500 dollar grant from Litenzburg Memorial Hospital and matching \$500 grant from Dr. and Amy Buhlke will be used to purchase supplies.

During registration you will hear from the kindergarten teachers and Mrs. Moser, visit the classrooms, and much more. Following registration you will be given an opportunity to complete the required registration forms. For those who are unable to attend on Thursday, April 7th, you can register your child on Friday, April 8th from 9:00-3:00 pm.
