To: All Central City Public Schools Community and Staff

The report was embargoed until Oct. 24. Our Elementary School, a Title I school, is listed as a Year 2 school in need of improvement. The reason is that only 40% of a tested grade level met proficiency standards last year. The proficiency levels were set by States following the 2002 federal mandate of No Child Left Behind. This law set proficiency standards to be met during the following 12 year cycles. The proficiencies were raised each year, and are now at a very high level. It widely known that the levels would not be met by many schools by 2014. The current report lists 480 Nebraska schools (close to half) which have not met the required target 2 consecutive years; there are 50 Title I schools on the Year 2 list. 40 States have applied for a waiver from the NCLB mandates, Nebraska did not apply.

Accountability is a good thing, if done locally. We have work and progress to do, and changes we need to consider. I believe it best when our local teachers are involved in gaining the known progress we need, as well as determining our scope and sequence of curriculum. This gets us all in line with ownership and accountability. We are starting now, in our district, on discussing these efforts and how we can improve all of our NeSA Test Scores. This will also include our work to produce our district's State of the School report.

My personal outlook on the State's Report is one of dissatisfaction. Overall, our Nation's public schools do very well. These schools provided good K-12 education to the people now attacking our schools. Moreover, the attacks over the past years have largely come from privately funded "think tanks" and other similar campaigns. Many of these efforts are following the original premise of NCLB, which was to rank schools so as to define "failing schools". Competition is great for many areas of our society and activities, except that public schools have always performed best when in an environment of local control and cooperation. Our public schools should be allowed to return to those roots. The Nebraska Board of Education is charged to regulate and administer K-12 public education. The NCLB mandate injected greater federal control of our schools, and, more and more, our Legislature has followed that path. A continued effort to mandate more rules and State/Federal testing control our classrooms now, rather than our local district, teachers and community.

We hope to keep you informed of our progress as we move forward.

Keep your child at home for treatment and observation

Fever (greater than 100 degrees and return to school only after temperature has been below 100 degrees for a minimum of 24 hours without medication)

Vomiting (even just once)

Diarrhea

Chills

Excessive nasal congestion with frequent blowing of nose

Colds are the most contagious during the first 48 hours. A child who has a fever should remain at home until he/she is "fever free" for a minimum of 24 hours. A child who has started antibiotics needs to be on the medication for 24 hours before considered non-contagious and able to return to school.

Remember, it is an extremely long day for a child who is sent to school ill. Not only is it difficult to concentrate and learn if repeatedly coughing or blowing your nose, but also it creates disruption in the classroom and affects the concentration and learning of your child's classmates. Remaining at home will help minimize the spread of the infections and viruses in the classroom.



MIDDLE SCHOOL FAMILIES

As I grow older, and see the influences that our kids have to deal with, I recognize that this is such a challenging time for kids to grow up. It sure makes me appreciate my childhood growing up in a small town with nothing really to worry about as long as I came home right after I heard the 6:00 town whistle. I'm becoming more convinced that for all the benefits that social media provides, I think we'd be better off without it. Nearly every day we deal with residual effects of facebook "chatter", text "conversations", and yik-yak. Our teachers have never faced greater pressure and accountability to make sure students reach high standards yet the obstacles mounted against them have never been more challenging. It seems that we are too often on the verge of some student issue or emotional breakdown due to what's being said or shown about someone on social media. Our teachers do a great job of trying to keep kids focused and engaged on school tasks but make no mistake, it is becoming more and more difficult.

I mentioned Yik-Yak above. This is a relatively new app that kids are downloading. It is a hotbed for cyberbullies. Users can make completely anonymous comments and anyone within a certain geographic range can see these posts. Essentially it is mindless chatter with no rules and no consequences. It is a place for faceless cowards to spew ignorance, hate, and hurt. I asked a few students if they were familiar with it. Some were and some were not. I worried that I only piqued their curiosity and so they might go and check it out. I think the best was to protect our kids from it is for adults to get on it and sometimes join the conversation by identifying yourself and letting kids know that you are monitoring their conversation. You can't be kicked off or be "un-friended". Anyone with the app can monitor or participate in the chatter. Please download the app and check it out and/or monitor your child's smart phone for it. There is no value at all in this app. In my opinion, it is simply another example of the moral decay of our country. If you have evidence of cyberbullying, please make a copy and contact local law enforcement and feel free to share it with me as well.

I've mentioned numerous times that if your child comes home with a report that just doesn't sit right with you, please call us to find out what the rest of the story is. It is very rare that a student shares the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth. I never conclude that I know all the facts after hearing just one side of the story. I would ask you to please reserve judgment until you have talked with us. I've had parents bring in to my office copies of facebook conversations by other parents and adults. It's frustrating when a parent takes to facebook to bash our school and teachers mainly for the purpose of garnering sympathy for themselves first and their child second. They are taking distorted information from their child, assuming it's true, and then going online to tell their "friends" about how horrible they have it. Sadly, people who follow them believe what they are saying to be true and they chime in with their sympathies and advice. It's very frustrating but I have faith that the overwhelming majority of our stakeholders know us, trust us, and support us. We have an online bullying reporting site. You can provide a tip for us anonymously if you wish but it always helps to include contact information, especially if you have evidence of cyberbullying. Please contact me or click on the "TIPS Report" icon on the school's website.
