## SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Once again, another summer has come and nearly gone. The 2017-2018 school year is just about upon us and the first school bells are scheduled to ring soon. With every summer, a considerable amount of planning and preparation takes place for the upcoming school year. I would like to applaud our district for continuously looking for ways to improve, motivate, and provide the very best education and opportunities for our students. As a district and community, we must demand excellence and be a progressive, forwardthinking district and community that strives to provide our students with and education that is second to none.

With each year, new faces fill the hallways and classrooms. Five new elementary teachers, three new middle school teachers, and a new Math teacher in the high school have made the commitment to being a part of the "Bison Family". ## Breakfast \& Lunch Information

Central City Public Schools will continue to utilize a point of sale system (POS) through the lunch line. You will note the software requires you, as the parent/guardian, to designate how you wish to appropriate your lunch deposit if you have multiple students on your account. For example, if you send payment for $\$ 100$ for your account, and have designated $60 \%$ for the High School Student and $40 \%$ for the Elementary Student, $\$ 60$ will be in the High Student's account, and $\$ 40$ in the Elementary Student's account. If you designate no \% amounts on your form, then the student accounts will be credited equally.
We are not able to transfer funds from one student account to another. When one student has a low balance, a deposit will need to be made for that individual student's account. If, at any time, you wish to change how you have chosen to split your deposits, please contact the Superintendent's office.

Now is a good time to start sending in payments to get your family lunch account ready to go. The Central City Public Schools lunch program will not extend credit to families for purchase of meals or a la carte food items. Remember: Your lunch account is a debit system. Money must be in the office no later than 10:00 a.m. Please allow one (1) day for processing of money into your lunch account. On-line payment options are available.

When a student reaches a - $\$ 10.00$ balance in their lunch account (or $-\$ 2.00$ reduced meals), the student will no longer be allowed to charge. A peanut butter sandwich and milk will be served. Students in the middle and high school will not be allowed to charge a la carte items once they reach a negative balance in their account. Parents can view student lunch accounts on Infinite Campus.

## Lunch Lines

Welcome back to school breakfast and lunch. We will be grilling hot dogs again this year. Elementary and Middle School will take place on Wednesday. High School will be on Thursday. I hope everyone will join us for lunch.

There will not be any changes to the foods we are able to serve as there has been in the past few years. The regulations for lower sodium levels that were to go into effect on July 1 have been put on hold for now. That does not mean students will see salt shakers back on the tables. It means the foods we are now serving will not have to be reformulated to reduce their sodium content.

I would like to urge everyone to fill out the Free or Reduced Meal application form even if you do not think you will qualify. Our schools are eligible for many grants and other programs if at least $50 \%$ or more of the enrolled students receive free or reduced meals. Because the middle school had $52 \%$ free or reduced meals, they have qualified for the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable grant. This does not mean we will receive the grant, but we qualified! This is all based on the percentage of free and reduced meals. The higher your percentage, the more likely you will receive the grant. Let's try to increase our percentage and chances of qualifying for grants by filling out the form. Thank you for taking the time to apply.

The High School cafeteria will have a slightly new look and name. The Leadership class thought of The Prairie. What an appropriate name. The new look will take place during the year by our art students.

Attendance Matters is a program developed to help area students get the most out of their education by making it to school as much as possible. Attendance is one of the most important factors of success in school. Research shows that students who consistently attend school and arrive on time have higher academic achievement than students who miss school. Research also shows that Nebraska high school students who miss more than 10 days of school score $16 \%-27 \%$ lower in reading and math skills than students who miss less than 10 days. For students who miss more than 20 days, those percentages jump up to $33 \%-44 \%$ (this is based on NeSA scores obtained from the Nebraska Department of Ed). Our goal is to help students uncover and address issues that may be keeping them from obtaining educational success.

For the second year, Central City Public Schools has partnered with Attendance Matters to resolve any attendance issues that may arise. Attendance Matters is committed to assisting your families in resolving attendance issues. We will work in conjunction with your child's building staff to help make sure your child is offered every resource, both school and community based, in order to help them be as successful as possible on their journey toward graduation.
